The renewed space hosts a 'New Art Showcase' from January to March, using contemporary artworks from up-and-coming local artists to revitalise the space, and display some of the boundless creativity to be found right on our doorstep. Curated by Mikesian Studio, the idea was to exhibit a range of artists who onlookers might not have encountered before, and bring them directly into a public space where art wasn't traditionally the focal point. Ahmed Mohammed has a compulsion to draw which involves a cyclical gestural drawing process. Since attending Venture Arts support studio he has discovered his artistic identity and developed a creative practice which spans textile art, printmaking, ceramics, drawing, and multimedia.

Working in a purely abstract way, in his large scale works he uses oil sticks to intuitively create expressive expanses of colour and form. In his printmaking pieces he creates bright blocks of colours that he gives titles such as Chicken Drumstick. Chicken Burger or Ice Cream and Spoon. All of his work incorporates bold and assertive mark-making in a spectrum of colours.

Alena Ruth is a freelance textile artist based in Manchester, specialising in rug tufting.

Originally from Blackpool, Alena's love for fibre came from being raised by her nan, who would sew clothes, knit snake-shaped draught excluders & cross-stitch tapestries with her young self.

Alena began making rugs with pneumatic tufting equipment in 2016 whilst studying at the University of Salford. The medium of rugs stood out to her as an island for play & immersion; using a cold, mechanical, gun-shaped tool to make strong, fluffy & tactile artwork. Sentimentality & soft feelings play into her chosen imagery; from long-lost loves, current mental health struggles & lingering emotions from past traumas.







### **FLEUR YEARSLEY**







Fleur Yearsley graduated from an MFA in painting at the Slade School of Fine Art as a recipient of the Gwen John Scholarship in 2017. Her work 'To The Moon and Back' (2019), was part of the John Moore Painting Prize 2020 at the Walker Art Gallery.

Yearsley is this year's selected artist for the Visual Arts Programme at The Edge Theatre & Arts Centre, which coincides with a solo show curated by Jez Dolan. Last year Yearsley took part in the Laura Owens Residency in Arles, France supported by the LUMA Foundation.

The artist has exhibited her work internationally including 'When The Lights Go Up' at Sapling Gallery, London, 'ONE MORE TUNE' representing Paradise Works at The Manchester Contemporary and the group show 'Desires' GNYP Gallery, Berlin.









John Cake uses traditional and digital techniques to make multi-layered, 'wild-style-mindmap' paintings and sculptures.

### MARIEL OSBORN





Her glitter tassel canopies and backdrops are made from hundred and thousands of hand tied strands with colours picked and blended to evoke different moods and feelings. The green and pink overhead streamers currently in the Art Hall are energetic and spring like.

Mariel produces a variety of pieces for commercial clients, private commissions and short term hire services. These include props for photoshoots, window dressing and sparkle backdrops and decorations for weddings and festivals.

Mariel also makes homewares too, using gummy colours and glossy finishes on curvy shelves, mirrors, coasters and artworks.

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Their work is a mix of powerful words, bold colour and graphic forms, with a focus on bringing bright, inclusive artwork to communal & public spaces.
